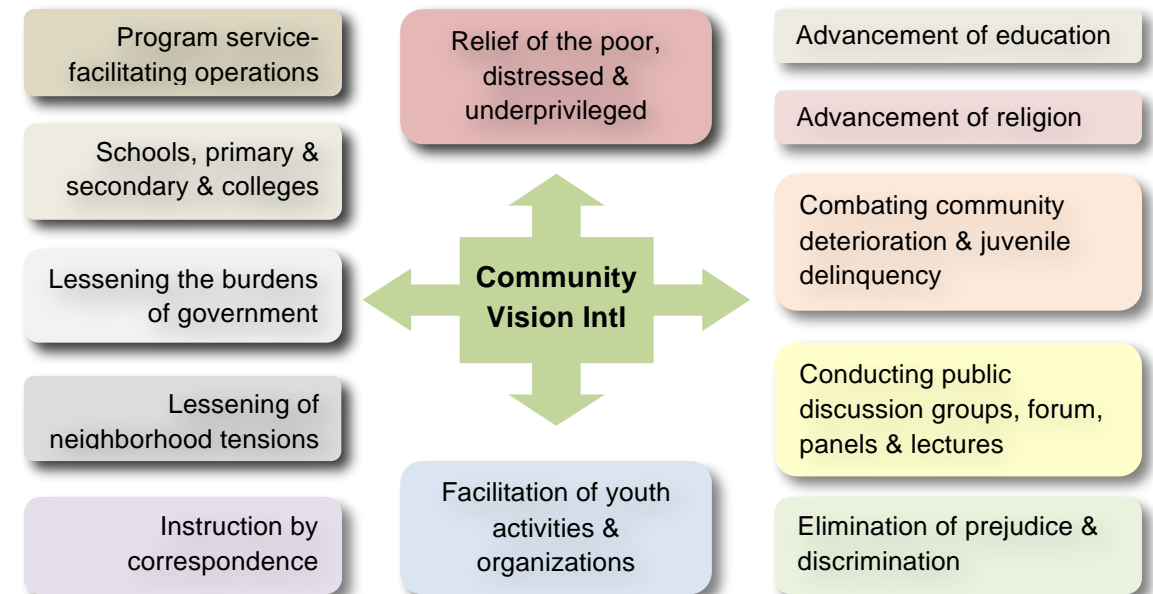
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Dear CVI² supporter,

Thank you for praying faithfully and supporting generously some of *Community Vision International's* 68 associates! God, you and over 1300 other partners have enabled CVI² associates to coach, mentor, train or serve over 132,000 individuals and 100s of agencies in over 50 countries at an average cost of \$18 per person served. CVI² associates have trained many in community transformation, cared for and empowered widows and orphans in distress, came alongside displaced or persecuted folk, and much more, impacting scores of communities in global, intercultural settings.

CVI² was organized in 2001 by *three* visionaries from *three* cultural backgrounds and with \$300. Trusting God to accomplish much through few at little cost, we launched little CVI² as a USA tax-exempt, low-profile, public, charitable-educational, non-profit corporation, suited to the 21st century. Specifically, we launched CVI² to enable a network of well-trained or experienced specialists *to transform communities, using available resources and transferable technologies, skills and tools.*

As a public non-profit, CVI² is legally authorized to provide these public services.



CVI² has provided these services in 10 world regions through its subcontracted associates who manage some 130 funded projects. Already-served regions are Central America & the Caribbean, East Asia & the Pacific, Europe, the Middle-East & North Africa, Russia & the Newly-Independent States, South America, South Asia, Sub-Saharan Africa, and North America.

To provide these services...

- CVI² accepts as associates only trained or experienced, visionary, transformation agents who have proven themselves to be passionate, efficient, self-starting leaders in their various fields of service. CVI² does not recruit unprepared youth.
- CVI² sometimes advises its associates, but does not dictate or limit where they can go, whom they can serve, and how they shall pursue their personal missions.
- CVI² grew each year by these averaged rates: \$48,224 income; \$48,208 expenses; 6.2 new associates; 11.8 new associate projects; 2573 additional people served.

To fund these services...

- CVI² has no heavy bureaucracy, no properties and no buildings.
- CVI² seldom solicits funds nor spends money on fund raising. Instead, new associates bring their supporters, and the participation of contributors like you grew from \$505 to \$924/year average. By 2011, we received 2805 contributions per year, ranging from \$10-\$10,000, and averaging \$156.
- CVI² directors also function daily as officers, and have thus far served without compensation.
- CVI² monthly moves 95% of its receipts directly to its associates for use in their needy communities. The remaining 5% pays for necessary fees, costs and accounting services.
